### **Richmondshire Property Marking**

Richmondshire Police have access to a DOT PEEN marking system. This device permanently marks many items with an owner's post code and house number. It can be used for most things excluding ceramics and glass.

## Project Servator

Deployments are continuing throughout Colburn and Catterick Garrison. All officers in the Neighbourhood Policing Team at Catterick have now been trained as Disruptive Effects Officers.

Project Servator will deploy uniformed and plain clothed officers with specially trained officers together with other resources such as police dog units and Road Policing Group. Officers will be deployed in a variety of targeted locations and will be highly visible; however, specific locations, times, and details of resources will not be publicised in advance and are intended to be **unpredictable**.

The primary aim is to deter, detect and disrupt criminal activity and those with hostile intent. In addition, officers will strive to reassure communities and encourage them to be vigilant and report all suspicious activity.
